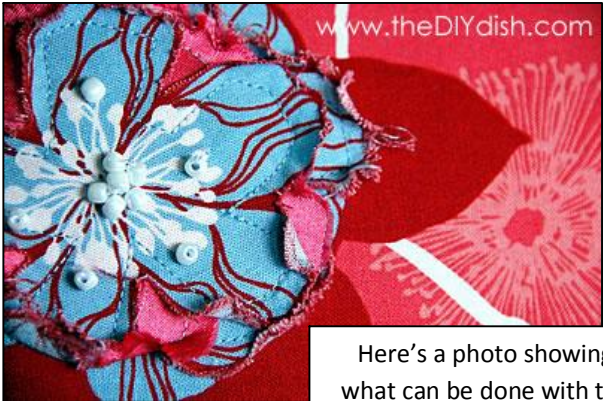


# Guest Spot on Studio5! "Frayed Applique"

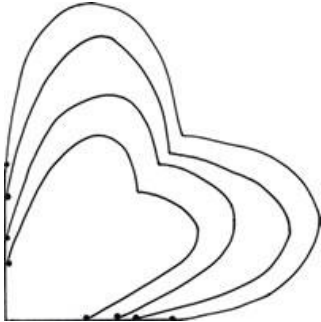
Thank you Studio5 for having us on your show! (May 4, 2010)

Below are the steps for making the flower design on the picnic quilt. Be sure to watch "The DIY Dish on Studio5" for the "how-to" tutorial on frayed appliqué. Frayed appliqué looks great on clothing, handbags, aprons, and home décor!

Here's a photo showing what can be done with the designs already in a piece of fabric! This is from Joel Dewberry's, *Deer Valley* line.



Print the pattern 4 times.  
Separate the 4 petals by cutting on the black lines.  
The following steps apply to each petal.



1. Fold fabric to the size of the petal. To know how much fabric to fold, simply place the corner of the pattern at the corner of the fabric.

2. Remove pattern and fold over again as shown in photo.



3. Pin pattern in place. Align the corner of the pattern with the corner of the fabric.



4. Begin cutting at the black dot found on the pattern. *For clarity, the yellow dots have been placed onto the photo.* Cut around petal and end at other black dot.

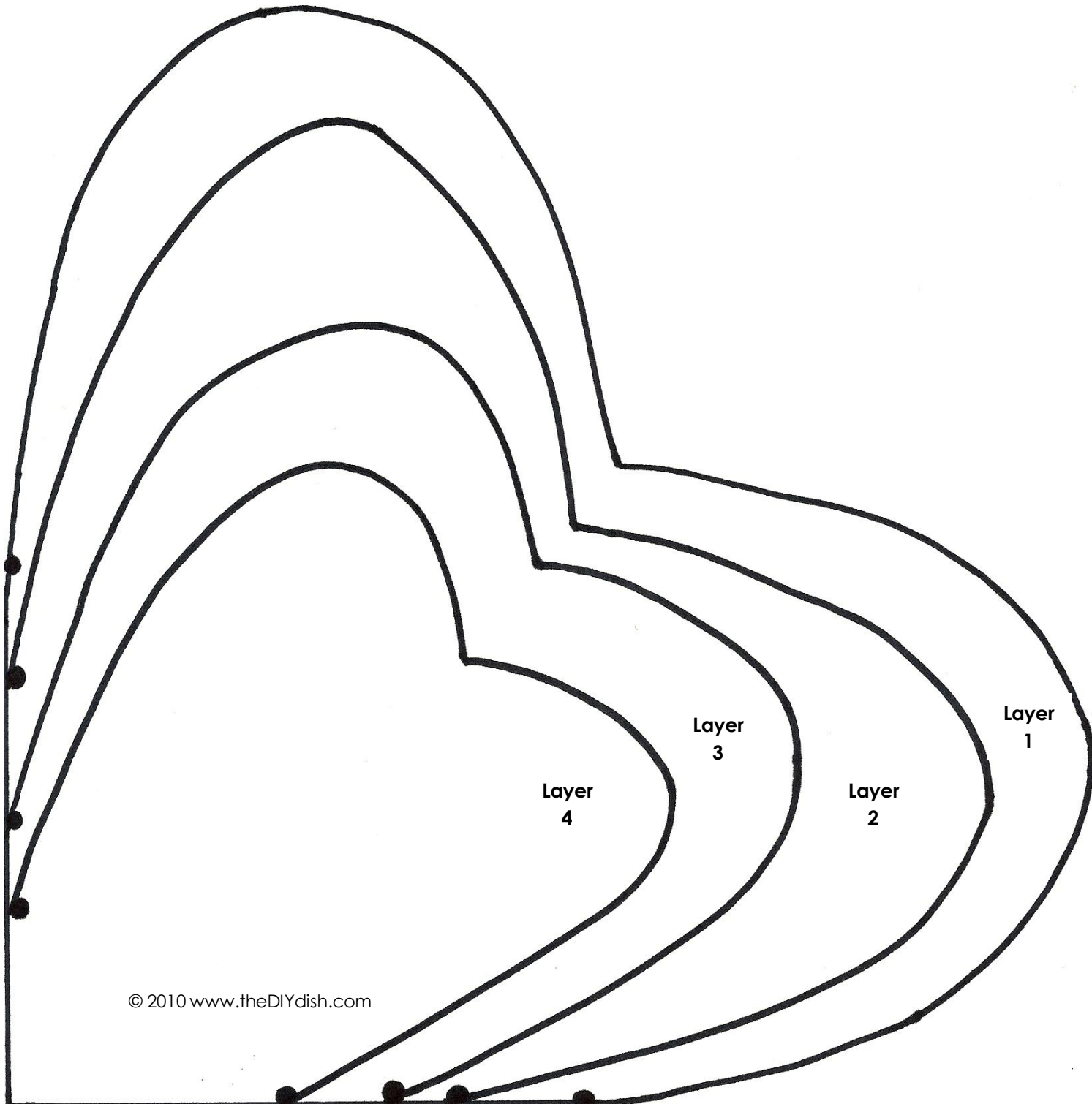


5. Unfold your fabric! You now have one layer of flower petals. Repeat steps 1-5 for each petal size.

Sew one layer down at a time. Layer so that petals are alternating between each other. Sew  $\frac{1}{4}$ " inside of the fabric and leave the raw edge to fray.
